

Citing E-Books Using MLA Guidelines, Rev. September 22, 2009

Guidelines for citing electronic books in the DSCC NetLibrary collection, as outlined here, are based on the MLA Handbook, 6th edition, which is available as a "Reserve" book at the LRC Circ desk for in library use.

Much of the information used to cite an eBook is found in the **eContent Details** tab within each ebook in the NetLibrary database and includes:

- Author of this ebook
- Title of ebook
- Title of the site where these e-books are found NetLibrary
- Publication date of ebook
- Name of sponsoring institution Dyersburg State Community College
- Date in a specific format which you accessed the ebook 22 September 2009
- <URL of the ebook in angle brackets>

⇒ **For Bibliographic References**, follow this *general format*. *Citations are double spaced*.

Author's last name, First name. Title underlined. City of publication: Publisher's name,

Publication date. Title of site underlined. Updated date of site. Date you accessed it <URL for the ebook>.

Some Examples of Copyrighted Titles:

Dronke, Peter. Medieval Latin and the Rise of European Love-Lyric. Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1968.

⇒ **For In-text Citations**, follow this general format.

Insert (Author's last name page numbers) right inside the text of your document immediately after the passage that you cited.

An Example:

During the Civil War, female couriers for spies "hid messages in their upswept hairdos, in the hems of their petticoats, and behind pictures in their locketts" (Zeinert 29-30).
