What are Scholarly Journals? Why are they important?

Scholarly journals, also called **peer-reviewed**, academic, refereed or professional journals, are a major source of information for writing term papers and research projects. *Articles in them have been reviewed and critiqued by the author's peers prior to publication, and they represent the most current research performed by scholars and scientists. **The database INFOTRAC** is the source for peer-reviewed articles.

Characteristics that distinguish these scholarly journals from popular magazines are:
